Summertime Activities

As the days grow longer and warmer, I'm looking forward to the summertime activities that take place in the Hollow. The Sleepy Hollow Homes Association is hard at work coming up with events to get us out of our homes and into the company of our neighbors. It will not be long now before the first Summer Social, currently scheduled for the Sunday evening of Memorial Day Weekend, but even before that we have a lot of great stuff in store.

It's not just the Homes Association board members who are active in creating and organizing the events that shape our community and I am pleased to use this letter as an opportunity to recognize some of the Sleepy Hollow residents who have, through their creativity, industriousness, and goodwill towards their neighbors taken the initiative to conjure out of thin air some great events for us all to enjoy. News & Notes from Supervisor Katie Rice

March 2022 - Winter is Over

...and rains didn't come. Our beautiful hill-sides are quickly losing their green and fire season is upon us once again. Our cloven hooved four-legged fire crews will soon be back for a visit – a great reason to take a walk on the Sleepy Hollow/Terra Linda Divide, and a reminder to continue working on our own properties to maintain a wildfire resistant landscape and a home hardened to resist ignition.

In case you missed it, lots of good work on the wildfire front happening beyond Sleepy Hollow including the creation of a 38-mile shaded fuel break stretching from eastern Corte Madera to Fairfax.

This project is a collaboration between all the fire agencies serving the greater Ross Valley: Marin County Fire Department, Ross Valley Fire Department, Kentfield Fire Protection District, and Central Marin Fire Department. It includes mapping, modeling, project design, public outreach and community meetings, field surveys, environmental compliance, and the actual work itself.

The purpose of the fuel break is to create and maintain a continuous reduced fuel and forest-health-restoration zone to reduce wildfire intensity and rate of spread. It will also provide strategic and safer locations for firefighters and emergency personnel to fight a wildfire in the event of ignition and make evacuations of nearby neighborhoods safer.

The initial shaded fuel break treatments are anticipated to begin in July 2022 and continue through January 2027. Treatments would continue annually between July and January and require ongoing maintenance annually or every 3 to 5 years depending on vegetation and rainfall conditions. More on Housing

In addition to going through the extensive public outreach and planning process to develop a Housing Element (see last month's

Butterfield Safety Survey Results and Community Meeting on April 21!

WE HEARD YOU! Thanks to all of you (almost 900 strong!) that filled out the recent Butterfield Safety Survey! The response was tremendous and demonstrates how many people use the Butterfield corridor and how much safety is a concern for people walking and biking. The Butterfield Safety Committee is working to improve the safety of the corridor for everyone, in particular vulnerable users (young people and older adults) and those traveling by active modes (walking, scooting, biking, etc.) and your responses go a long way to help inform our work.

Please see the infographic at <https://tinyurl.com/2p925mct> that breaks down the survey responses into areas such as who responded, survey findings, support for changes and importantly, and conclusions drawn from results. Highlights: few people walking and biking are always comfortable on Butterfield, there's a large number of unreported bike crashes (most involving children), and there is broad support for a designated bike/walk lane in the unincorporated section of Butterfield.

To that end, we hope you will join us for a Community Meeting on April 21 from 6:00 to 7:00 pm (via zoom) to review the survey, review/discuss concepts for crosswalk

“News and Notes”), the County of Marin (and cities and towns) are grappling with another piece of state legislation that went into effect this year regarding residential development – SB 9.

SB 9 went into effect on January 1, 2022. The law allows for the development of two units or duplexes on lots within districts zoned for single-family homes. This would include Sleepy Hollow. In essence, the law removes a local jurisdiction's authority to require discretionary review for qualifying projects and allows for ministerial approval of urban lot splits assuming they meet certain criteria including minimum lot size and each lot is approximately the same size. Lots created under SB 9 could not be further subdivided.

On April 11, the Marin County Planning Commission will consider proposed interim ordinances that would align County development code with SB 9, and importantly, where the law allows for the establishment of dis-

cretionary standards, create those standards. These would include rules limiting the size of new residences developed under SB 9, apply minimum floor area ratio, building height, and property line setbacks, access to public right of way, owner occupancy, and whether to allow ADUs on properties that have undergone an urban lot split.

cretionary standards, create those standards. Please Park Bikes Here

We appreciate that riders of all ages ride bikes to the Sleepy Hollow Community Center, and want to encourage that with safe, adequate parking. (Well maybe not adequate for July 4th, but we are already planning for overflow capacity).

Please use the new, temporary corral in the County easement adjacent to the drive through. The corral location is temporary pending County consideration of a more permanent structure, sketches of which are shown here. Inside the temporary corral are now two racks, which as placed will accommodate more bikes. The longer rack, placed parallel to Butterfield, is best for longer bikes such as cargo bikes. The shorter rack, placed perpendicular to Butterfield, is accessed from both sides and is best for shorter bikes. Please bring and use a bike lock if you want to.

The corral is set back from the Butterfield lane line 11 feet, so there is not only an 8' bike lane but a further 3 feet of separation. A continuous fence 4' high separates the bike corral from the bike lane, with access to the corral only from the path and at each end near the path. There is an access pathway from the street to the path without going on the drive through, and an access pathway on the south side of the corral separating it from parked cars.

With experience and feedback from users and drivers, we will make improvements to the location, size, shape, access, etc. before committing to permanent construction. This and County approval will take some time, although we hope to have a permanent corral before family swim season begins. Space is limited on the main lot, and drainage restrictions in some areas limit our options.

With your experience, please give us feedback on the safety of access, bike security, size, number of bikes accommodated, and any other thoughts. Drivers, we welcome feedback on visibility and any other issues. Are there other cautions we can offer drivers to improve the safety of all?

MMWD: A New Virtual Reservoir for Marin

Historically Marin has relied heavily on Lagunitas Creek, and our seven local reservoirs for Marin's water supply. For many years the district has slowly, with a variety of projects, increased the available supply. Since the 1980s the water district has partnered with Las Galinas Valley Sanitary District to increase the water supply by bring recycled water to most of central San Rafael. Within the last several months the water district board of directors launched an expansion of that effort, which will expand the recycled water system to Peacock Golf Course in eastern San Rafael. In 1976 the district entered a contract with Sonoma Water that allowed our district to purchase annually up to 4,300 acre feet of water annually. Subsequently agreements were made allowing the transfer of water to Marin from Sonoma through the North Marin Water District pipes. In 2005, the district amended the Russian River agreement to allow for the purchase of an additional 10,000 acre feet of water per year. However, the quantity of water coming to Marin Water had been handicapped by limitations of the transmission system at Kastania Pump Station at Kastania Road in Petaluma. With those limitations Marin has traditionally received only about half of the amount which would be allowed by the purchase agreements.

However, after more than 24 months of drought, unreliable weather patterns and climate change, it is clear to most that we need more water. That reality has fostered a renewed effort to increase the water supply.



For the final months of last year, and into January of this year, the district has been finalizing an effort to increase the annual amount of water imported from Sonoma. Our district purchased the Kastania Pump Station facility from Sonoma Water, and has refurbished the pumps and made other improvements in pipeline facility. The project required additional agreements with Sonoma Water and North Marin Water, all of which have successfully been achieved, making it a regional effort by all three water districts.

This project improvement has increased our water supply by over 5,000 acre feet per year, more than the full annual supply from our own Bon Tempe Reservoir – about 18% of our annual drinking water demand.

Significantly, this project demonstrates the potential for a regional approach to solving our water supply needs with mutual benefit for all. We need to focus on possible regional efforts which can, working together with other agencies in our region, maximize our supply, storage and delivery of water to our water consumers and the regional environment.

The project was completed with a collaborative effort by the three water districts working together for the regional benefit. This kind of collaboration, across borders and jurisdictional lines, can potentially bring even greater positive benefits for the entire region.

Sleepy Hollow Fire Protection District. And, we will install a water-wise drip irrigation system. The next projects in Phase 2 include a new playground and an emergency supplies storage building (addition to the Pool House), required for our

lease with the Fire District. We estimate the cost of these two features to be \$190,000 in direct and soft costs. Our plan is to complete both elements this year, then focus on other goals in 2023 including an outdoor fire feature, upgraded outdoor furniture, a movable partition in the interior space to allow more

simultaneous activities in the main building, new signage and entry gate, and more. We need your support now for playground and emergency supplies

storage (which will free up space for the flex, exercise room). Of course, your pledge to make a gift or series of gifts during the year will also be welcome.

This is a reminder that our community has given over \$1,525,000 to support the Community Center Renovation since this effort began in 2013. Included in this amount is more than \$230,000 in gifting just since August 1, 2022 for the current work. Pledges add another \$40,000. In addition, generous members of our community have loaned \$210,000 to support Phase 2, which has allowed us to complete the bathroom, locker rooms and showers and make progress toward the next priorities. As you may know, we have suffered from the effects of inflation and rising construction and material costs; therefore, we have exceeded our budget which in turn required us to make prudent decisions to prioritize the work. Our fundraising goal has increased in relation to those increased costs. We also seek challenge gifts or sponsorships,

but we need residents to donate for these good things to happen. If you have not yet given, or have not given in the last 2 or 3 years, or if you can give more, please do so.
